CAREERS

US College Applications & Sports Scholarships

As part of our Careers Programme, last week saw a focus on applications to Universities in the United States. We welcomed Kyle Overby, Director of AESA Prep Academy in Barcelona and Sarah Stearns from EducationUSA to talk to students and parents across the school about applying to study at university or college in the US and streamed the presentation online to other members of BISA (Barcelona International Schools Association). Sarah Stearns gave an accessible breakdown of how students should go about applying to US institutions. She spoke passionately about the benefits of studying in the USA and gave lots of advice on how to find the university or college that most suits each particular student. She covered the Common App process and clarified the different components that make up a US college application as well as providing timeframes, deadlines and tips for essays and letters of recommendation. It was also very useful to hear about the financial aid available to international students. You can see the presentation here. EducationUSA is a free service, so if your child is thinking of applying to the US, do not hesitate to contact them for more information. Kyle Overby explained the process of applying for a sports scholarship



in the US and our student athletes were able to meet with him in a small group to gain insight into this process through the NCAA. He talked them through eligibility rules specific to their sports and was able to give them personalised advice on how to proceed with their applications.

GCSE DRAMA

Last week our Year 11 GCSE Drama students performed their final devised examination piece for students across the secondary school and it was a resounding success!

The GCSE devised piece is a student-led, independent collaborative project. Students choose a stimulus that is meaningful to them and decide on a message for their play. Then they use practical strategies to explore the themes and come up with ideas for characters and situations. As the piece develops and scenes are created, the students are constantly reflecting on the style and structure of the play and whether or not the message is coming through. They must make very careful decisions on characterisation and be able to identify key moments in the decision-making process as they will also have to write a 2000 word portfolio on the development of the piece.

'Is this Ok?'

The Year 11 play is called 'Is this OK?' and deals with issues around gender expectations and societal norms, sending a clear message that everyone is equal and that there is always a different perspective to consider. Sofia Gikic, Sade Maccow, Martina Vilert and Lucy Bohm gave skilful performances, whilst Vinny Todorovich supported and enhanced the actors through his lighting design using our new professional lighting rig in our Performance area. The actors spent time talking to the audience at the end of each show and the feedback was invaluable for helping them evaluate the play in their written portfolio. We hope that some of our younger students are inspired to take GCSE Drama in Year 10!

KS3 IMPORTANT DATES (YEAR 7, 8 AND 9)

After a short break the children put on their beekeeper suits and walked down to the farm where they met all the different bees including the queen. The bee farmers used a special smoke to make these bees hungry and keep them calm whilst we observed them working. The children were very lucky during the visit to see a baby bee being born and hatching out of the nest. Everyone was very surprised to see it starting to work only moments after being born. Thank you to all the staff who attended this trip and made sure our little learners had a fantastic learning experience.





As part of our World War 2 Topic Unit, Year 6 recently enjoyed Evacuee Day. They travelled back in time to imagine themselves as children who had been evacuated during the Blitz (accompanied by a Land Girl and Neville Chamberlain, a.k.a. Ms O'Connor and Mr Sumner!)

In the morning, they followed a WW2 rationing recipe to make delicious rock cakes, as well as using recycled materials to craft our own gas masks. In the afternoon, the classes took part in workshops to role play the evacuee experience and to learn WW2-era children's games, such as Hopscotch and Jacks. They finished off their day with a singalong of popular songs from the era, such as "We'll Meet Again" by Vera Lynn. It was a memorable day and the children had a wonderful time learning all about life as a WW2 evacuee. A big thank you to Ms O'Connor and Mr Sumner for organising such a wonderful curriculum focus day.
