

Our teachers follow from their homes, a system of distance learning, trying to maintain the teaching and learning of the students. Obviously this is not ideal, but they are doing their best to maintain the academic routines, while trying to encourage the children with their learning.

I want to celebrate with you the leadership of our Director Mr Simon Mower, with the help of Mr John Prince, and the whole SLT, giving encouragement to his team during this adversity. We are proud to have you all so committed, fighting for our school. They are all making an enormous effort to overcome the difficulties, which in turn for them, represents this situation. Many live far away from their families, managing emotionally the worries derived from that distance. It is very important for us to take care of our teachers, that they feel safe in their jobs, that their salaries are not reduced, and that their confidence in BCG is not shaken. We need them now, and will need them more when all this is over.



Given the extent and importance of this beautiful education project for your children, we cannot be stopped by the coronavirus, which concerns us all now. It will be over sooner than later.

Dear Parents

Here are a few things to help make things easier:

Early Years and Primary Students

They do not need to do all of the work set, they must not feel pressure to complete everything. Our teachers are providing lots of exciting material and projects to keep the children learning but it is not all essential. Ask the form teacher which things to focus on - Maths and English for example.

Secondary Students

Please ensure you stick to the timetable as much as possible and continue to do the lessons as they are set. This is an important time in your education and the work you are given now is what you would have done in school so your learning is continuing as normal. Please read Mr Prince's message about exams. Everyone

The best way for everyone to manage this situation is to keep to a routine. Sensible bedtimes, proper breakfast, following the school time table (upper school) and doing the same routine each day. Children should not stay up later than normal or watch too many films etc.

Lastly, I would like to make clear my huge appreciation and respect for our amazing teachers. They are entirely committed to your children's learning and I hope that you find a moment to thank them personally because they really deserve it.

External Exams (Year 10,11,12 and 13)

Dear Parents,

You are probably aware that the GCSE, As and A level exams for the May/June Exam session have been cancelled in the UK. For International Schools, the statement from Pearson/Edexcel, the BCG Exam Board is as follows:

"Where schools are open and a country is deemed safe, exams for iPrimary, iLowerSecondary, International GCSE, and International A Level will take place for students outside of the UK in May and June 2020"

Thus we will be entering all students in Year 11, 12 and 13 (and certain students in Year 10) for external Exams in the usual manner.

If the situation changes and we are unable to sit Exams in May/June, we will be following the same processes and procedures as UK schools in determining the grades to be awarded for August. These procedures are yet to be decided, although a decision is imminent.

However, in either case it is essential that all pupils in Exams years continue to work online in close cooperation with their teachers as the work being set is in preparation for the upcoming exams and will support the achievement of higher grades by whatever means they are assessed.

We will keep you updated as the situation evolves, but for now please let your children know that they need to carry on studying as usual, albeit within the new context of distance learning.



IB Update


